

Organizer to Address BSU On Pan-African Unification

The organizer of the all-African People's Revolutionary Party will be the keynote speaker Thursday evening at a meeting of the Black Student Union.

Kwame Toure, one of the leading black activists in the U.S., will address the public on many issues, including his association with the Black Panthers, anti-apartheid, and Pan-Africanism, in Diefendorf 147 at 7:30 p.m.

"Pan-Africanism involves the importance of unification among black students and black people in

general," Josie Rollan, a member of the Black Student Union, said. "Black unity is important. It's important in order to organize for liberation."

Kwame has been at the forefront of the struggle for black rights. He has been a leading activist for civil rights, and provided leadership in the black-power movement. He has also been a driving force in the student non-violent coordinating committee.
